4. **Remarks from ANS Executive Committee** (Pointer)

President John Kelly provided an update to the division as both the president, and the board liaison. President Kelly acknowledged that he's following up with some of the outcomes from the possible changes come from the divisions. He and the board are looking for input from the divisions and

committees through direction and implementation on ways of improve upon outcomes for members which streamlining the fiscal state. Requests that the divisions to make use of their respective board liaisons. President Kelly talked to the local sections who were worried about revenue sharing because of the connection related to the revenue and volunteer effort to the local sections themselves. The rhetoric question that was posed was “How do we give motives to volunteers to continue to do this should we move to this shared budget model?”.

Dr. Dave Pointer provided a discussion around his motives for voting to pass the conference revenue redistribution that is being implemented across The Society. At present the spend-level is 10M\$/yr, and revenue is 8M\$/yr. Dr. Pointer stated that in five years the ANS would spend down its unrestricted funds along with Division funds to the point that it wouldn't be solvent if changes aren't made.

Dr. Dave Pointer and the members of the committee thanked John from his presence.

“A nomination for TAA rejected for the first time may be resubmitted for re-evaluation within two years from the original submission date. Nominators should update the nomination package before it is resubmitted for re-evaluation. If the nomination for re-evaluation is rejected the second time, a new nomination may not be submitted for evaluation again in less than five years from the resubmission date”

APPENDIX D Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Report – Annual Meeting 2019

2018 has been a very healthy financial year for THD thanks to generous contributions from the NURTEH-17 organizers (\$31,180) and healthy meeting participation in ICAPP and ATH (\$12,175). We note the substantial health of the finances of the division, which has led to the desire of investing funds toward the creation of scholarships and awards.

A proposal to this end has been prepared by the treasurer and approved by the THD executive committee as well as the relevant ANS committee in November 2018. As a result, \$48,000 dollars from the general account and \$15,000 from the award account have been allocated to a new scholarship account. The Lawrence Hochreiter memorial graduate scholarship will be allocated starting in the 2020/2021 cycle.

Our division holds now three separate accounts: one general account, an award account and a scholarship account. Spending from the general account is unrestricted up to the total value of the account, as long as the transactions are approved by the division executive committee. Spending from the other accounts is restricted to ensure the long term availability of the fund to support the THD awards and scholarships. The general fund is supported by membership dues (referred as the Dues Revenue Allocation) and income from conferences hosted by the division (referred as the Meeting Revenue). The scholarship/awards accounts have primarily been funded by generous donations from the organizers of conferences supported by the division (referred as the Contribution Revenue).

The balance of the award fund account as of January 2019 is \$35,881 due to a investment loss of 6.78%. The spending limit for the restricted account is \$1,780. The balance of the scholarship account is \$63,000. The balance for the unrestricted account is \$48,720 as of March 31st 2019, not reflective of additional \$1,000 in expenses already incurred (NEED and student conference support). A summary of the current status of the division is provided in Table 1. Note that we expect a significant meeting revenue from NURETH-18 in Portland. This revenue will very be reduced (less than half) due to recent changes in ANS society-wide policies. Combined with slight lower than expected numbers for papers, the meeting revenue is in fact likely to be much lower.

The treasurer was tasked with preparing a proposal for a service award. However ANS tends to frown upon in recent years to scholarships and awards that are not fully funded. The following is stated in the requirements for award proposals:

- a. *A sound financial plan to maintain the award in perpetuity:*
 - i. *\$15,000 is necessary to fully-fund a \$500 annual monetary award component;*
 - ii. *\$20,000 is necessary to fully-fund a \$1,000 annual monetary award component; or, a \$2,000 bi-annual monetary award component;*
 - iii. *\$40,000 is necessary to fully-fund a \$2,000 annual monetary award component.*

A service award would require at least \$20000 for a \$1000 award, which would bring down the budget to ~\$28,0000 which would give THD 10 years of spending at the current rate before running out of money. Fortunately, the award balance greatly exceeds the \$20000 needed for the TAA. An addition of just \$7000 to the award fund would be sufficient to fund both the TAA and the service award at \$1000. However, the stock market has been volatile and last year ANS posted a significant loss and we may have to add additional funds to fully fund the newly established scholarship.

At this point in time the treasurer advises caution since the meeting revenue has been greatly reduced by ANS (1/2 of previous revenue). Before instituting a new award or scholarship, the treasurer recommends to wait until the picture for the revenue of NURETH-18 is clear. A revenue exceeding \$7000 should be sufficient to establish the award given the remaining balance in the award fund.

The budget proposal for 2020 is almost unchanged with regards to 2019 in terms of expenses. I propose a reduction to ANS meeting student support program contribution from \$3000 to \$2000. In fact, no meeting revenue is expected in 2020 since both ICAPP'20 and ATH'20 will be held overseas.





